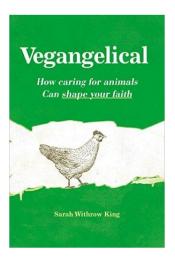


Is There a Biblical Basis for Veganism?

Sarah Withrow King starts a conversation about animal stewardship as a necessary part of Christian peace and justice

Christians have discussed and shared their beliefs about many pressing polical issues such as abortion, human trafficking and environmental degradation, but a casual Christian discussion about animal stewardship may be harder to come by. Unless, of course, you are lucky enough to be at a social gathering with theologian and animal welfare advocate, Sarah Withrow King. "Inevitably, I'll end up talking about Jesus or chickens. . . I am really bad at small talk," says King. However, she is ready for the conversation to spread with the hope of developing a theological framework to govern our treatment of animals and our relationship to them.



King has always had a passion for justice, but never knew just where she was being called to work." That is, until she came across a booklet on animal abuse one day at lunch that would unexpectedly change the course of her life and, indirectly, the lives of many readers. King's passionate journey has brought her to write *Vegangelical: How Caring For Animals Can Shape Your Faith* (Zondervan, June 2016), which presents readers with a Biblical perspective? of animal welfare.

King begins by exploring the commonly held values of Christianity from dominion to stewardship to love and service in order to establish a biblical foundation for Christian animal ethics. "How we see ourselves, and especially how we see

ourselves in relation to God and to one another, informs every decision we make," says King. She pushes forward to demonstrate the many ways humans are using animals today and concludes with practical guidence for readers who want to start making changes in their lives and begin to alleviate animal suffering.

King's biblical, intellectual, grounded and sometimes humorous approach will make readers fall in love with her as an author, while the words of *Vegangelical* will "open your eyes to truths that will make you a better human being," says Rev. Carlos Malave. "Your understanding of compasion, violence and life will be transformed." *Vegangelical* is a compassionate and welcoming invitation to reconsider God's design, and how he intended the relationship of his creation to be.





Sarah Withrow King earned her MTS with a concentration in Christian Faith and Public Policy from Palmer Seminary of Eastern University in 2014, then started a Christian outreach program for PETA before returning to Eastern University as Deputy Director of the Sider Center and the co-director of CreatureKind, a project to engage churches on farmed animal welfare issues. She is the author of Animals Are Not Ours (No Really, They're Not): An Evangelical Animal Liberation Theology (Cascade Books, 2016) and she is an Associate Fellow of Oxford University's Oxford Centre for Animal Ethics.

Suggested Interview Questions for Sarah Withrow King, author of *Vegangelical*

- 1. How did your journey to learn more about animal welfare and its biblical connection begin?
- 2. What are some of the most common misconceptions about being a vegan?
- 3. Is the intention of *Vegangelical* to convert all of its readers to a vegan lifestyle? Is it worth reading even if you don't plan to stop eating meat?
- 4. You refer to popular, often ridiculous, Vegan survival scenario questions, which is your favorite? Do you have an answer?
- 5. What was our original design in the Garden of Eden? How did God intend humans to relate to animals?
- 6. How do dominion over the animals and animal stewardship work hand in hand?
- 7. Owning a pet seems to be a caring thing to do. What troubles are arising with animal owners that works against our calling to care for them?



- 8. How is our desire to use animals for entertainment or sport working against our biblical responsibility to animals?
- 9. What is the reality of animal experimentation? Is it ever ok?
- 10. What advice would you give to the reader who wants to begin their journey as a vegan? Where do they start?
